    - i. Joint Powers Agreement Consideration of Extension Discussion

This item remains on the agenda for additional discussion and updates by the Board if necessary.

As discussed at the August FMAA meeting, the Amended and Restated Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) between Blaine County and the City of Hailey dated July, 2011, expires on December 31, 2020. The JPA is the enabling document for the Friedman Memorial Airport Authority as an independent entity and is necessary to maintain the current operation of the Authority and the Airport. The 2011 amendment to the JPA contemplated normal operations of the Airport as well as revised provisions addressing the planning of a replacement airport. This expanded the Board from 5 to 7 and requires at least two votes from each the County and the City on almost all decisions. The 2011 JPA remains the document under which the Authority and airport currently operate.

The present JPA could be amended to simply extend its duration for a period of time, or a more extensive revision may be appropriate based on discussions between the City and County. In any event, a decision to extend and/or otherwise amend the JPA must be made no later than our December, 2020 meeting.

#### i. Terminal Area Plan – Update

After additional coordination between Staff, our planning consultant (Mead & Hunt) and the FAA, Staff is initiating the start of the Terminal Area Plan project based on a revised approach recommended by Mead & Hunt. The study will begin with a terminal area capacity threshold study, or "trigger study". The deliverable for this study will be a concise but substantiated technical report, which would later be integrated into the facility requirements chapter of the Terminal Area Plan. Staff, Mead & Hunt, and the FAA believe this effort is appropriate and the best use of resources based on current circumstances. Results of this trigger study will put SUN in a position to move forward with design of terminal area improvements when conditions warrant.

Mead & Hunt will attend the meeting to present a short presentation about the project including this initial path forward, as well as answer any questions from the Board.

#### ii. Instrument Approach Improvements – Update

Over the course of the past several months, our approach planner has continued to work toward approval of the new approach procedure with FAA and end users. Significant progress has been made and a final meeting with the FAA is taking place on August 27.

An update regarding the outcome of the meeting with the FAA and expected next steps to have the approach available for this winter will be provided by Staff at the meeting.

A. Chairman Report

Board Chairman Greenberg reported the ongoing work regarding COVID-19 testing,

implications, and protective protocols regarding staff.

#### B. Blaine County Report

Board Member McCleary mentioned the governor is shifting planning to the local health boards to make decisions regarding COVID-19. They are working together with Board of Health to establish a Response Plan the only potential indirect impact to the airport might be if a 14-day quarantine was required for travelers coming into the county through FMA if it reaches this phase under the plan. Continued public education on Blaine County COVID-19 policies is recommended.

Board Member Fosbury reported the importance of communicating the COVID-19 Mitigation policy to the community. Discussion followed regarding the policies in place at the airport.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported that the airport has a comprehensive Standard Operating Procedure/COVID-19 and Infectious Disease Manual that continues to be updated as the CDC releases new guidance.

C. City of Hailey Report

No report was given.

D. Fly Sun Valley Alliance Report

Carol Waller reported that FSVA is working toward a winter schedule and that revenues and capacity will be down due to COVID-19. It is expected that the winter schedule will be released in the next few months.

#### E. Airport Manager Report (see Power Point Presentation)

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported unofficially that the July passenger enplanements are down 74% from last year. Airport operations were down 21% in July mostly due the cancelled fly-in event. Year-to-date, the airport is down 9% for overall operations. He also stated there has been an increase in northern operations due to a shift in the wind pattern this season and the airport is seeing an uptick of recreational flyers. Continued public education on the noise abatement program is ongoing.

Airport Manger Pomeroy reported that there is new signage at the airport regarding the mask requirement within Blaine County and the City of Hailey. We are having excellent compliance from passengers.

#### A. NEW BUSINESS

#### 1. Joint Powers Agreement - Consideration of Extension- Discussion

Jim Laski, Airport Attorney, reported that the Joint Powers Agreement expires at the end of this year and the sponsors need to decide if they want to extend it or make changes, as necessary. Board Member Haemmerle suggested forming an executive committee to review the Joint Powers Agreement. He stated his concerns regarding the airport boundary.

Board Chairman Greenberg suggested that the elected bodies nominate representatives to review the document, then come together with the changes echoing Board Member Haemmerle's suggestion. Once the document has been reviewed, it would be taken back to the corresponding elected bodies (City of Hailey City Counsel and Blaine County Commissioners), and finally the Board, for adoption. Jim Laski pointed out that the JPA is a sponsorship

between Blaine County and the City of Hailey.

#### B. CONTINUING BUSINESS

#### 1. Construction and Capital Project

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported one bid was received from Idaho Materials and Construction totaling \$871,068, which was negotiated down to \$809,020. The Engineer's estimate was \$619,485. Based on the higher than expected bid price, staff and the engineer recommended rejecting the bid and considering a rebid of the project in the winter. Nathan Culava with T-O Engineers answered questions about the high bid price and lack of multiple bidders. He reported that the project is an anomaly because it is too big for the smaller contractors and too small for the larger contractors.

MOTION: Made by Board Member Haemmerle to reject the bid for the parking lot project. Seconded by Board Member Fosbury.

#### 2. Airport Planning Projects

i. Land Acquisition Environmental Assessment (EA) – Project Kick-off
Airport Manager Pomeroy reported the EA is underway for acquisition of
approximately 385 acres of Eccles Flying Hat Ranch for approach
protection and land use compatibility. Brad Rolf with Mead & Hunt
presented a summary of the EA process which is required by the FAA due
to the potential federal funding that will be used to acquire the land. Mr.
Rolf noted there is a small 17-acre parcel that will be analyzed as part of
the EA that could potentially be used for aeronautical development as
outlined in the Airport Master Plan. If that development were to happen,
there would need to be additional planning and only at the direction of the
Board. He further discussed the public involvement as well as the FAA
review and approval processes. Mr. Rolf noted this project is on a fast
track, but the schedule could be impacted by potential unforeseen
challenges during the study process. Board discussion followed.
Board Member Fosbury questioned the boundaries on the county GIS
regarding the acreage envelope. His concern was a potential area of land

regarding the acreage envelope. His concern was a potential area of land that lies within the city of Bellevue. Board Member Fosbury stated he would like to refrain from purchasing property within Bellevue City limits.

Jim Laski, Airport Attorney, stated the draft appraisal shows land near the highway as part of the acquisition and the map shown in the presentation may be off a little. Airport Manager Pomeroy and Mr. Rolf stated they would confirm the boundary with the landowner.

ii. Terminal Area Plan - Update

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported there is no significant movement related to the Terminal Area Plan project at this time. The project consultant will be attending a meeting with the FAA this week regarding forecasting during the pandemic. This meeting may provide additional guidance for this project. The start date of the project is still to be determined.

#### U.S. CONTRACT TOWER ASSOCIATION

FAA's Contract Tower (FCT) Program continues to be a model for efficient and cost-effective government programs. It regularly receives positive endorsements from all stakeholders, including NTSB, the DOT Inspector General, airport management, Congress and, most importantly, the users of the aviation system. A total of 256 airports from 46 states currently participate in the program, including 11 that are in the cost-share program for airports with a benefit/cost (b/c) ratio below 1.0. In 2018, two new airports were added to the program - North Texas Regional Airport (Denison, Texas) and Albert J. Ellis Airport (Richlands, N.C.). FAA announced on June 3, 2019, that the agency will accept new airport applicants for the program. Next airport to be added to the program is Hammond Northshore Regional Airport in Louisiana on October 1, 2020. Other airports that have applied or are expected to apply for the program are San Bernardino, CA; Austin Executive, TX; Houston Executive, TX; Gulf Shores, AL; Nashville John Tune Airport, TN; Lewis, IL; Boulder City, NV; Talkettna, AK; Leesburg, VA; Auburn, AL; Fort Collins, CO; North Palm Beach County, FL; Marana, AZ; Bend, OR; Truckee, CA; Chester County, PA; French Valley Airport, Riverside County, CA, and Mankato, MN.

The DOT Inspector General released its latest audit on the contract tower program on April 28, 2020 and, as expected, the report was very positive for the overall program from a cost-effectiveness and safety perspective.

To provide long-term stability to airports in the FCT program, we continue to proactively reach out to our friends in Congress. Regarding COIVD-19 and impact on the national air transportation system and the subsequent dramatic reduction in airport revenues across the board, contract towers nationwide must remain fully operational to ensure these airports/towers play a key role in the recovery of the national air transportation system <a href="mailto:and-color: blue current-national-emergency and-color: blue current-national-emergency and-color: blue current-national-emergency and-color: blue current-national-emergency and non-COVID-19 related disaster and emergency relief efforts; federal, state and local law enforcement operations, and military training/readiness activity. The vast majority of the \$10 billion Congress provided to airports in the CARES ACT was targeted to large-hub and medium-hub air carrier airports and did not focus on airport relief funds to support contract towers. Unfortunately, the \$100 million provided to the 3,000 plus general aviation airports in the CARES ACT was stretched very thin.

On July 27, Senate Republican leaders released their proposed next round of coronavirus relief (the <u>Health, Economic Assistance, Liability Protection and Schools - HEALS Act</u>), including \$10 billion for airports. A summary of the bill states that "the proposal provides \$10 billion to FAA's Airport Improvement Program to maintain operations at our nation's airports that are facing a record drop in passengers. Funding will be distributed by statutory entitlement and enplanements formulas and may be used for operating expenses and debt service. Funding is also set aside to maintain Contract Tower operations."

\$9.5 billion of the \$10 billion is reserved for commercial service airports (10,000 annual enplanements or more) based on passenger enplanements and cargo activity. The remaining \$500 million of the \$10 billion package is designated for nonprimary (fewer than 10,000 annual enplanements) and general aviation airports apportioned in the same manner as the CARES Act with \$8.15 million of those funds reserved for Contract Tower airports to cover lawful expenses to support FAA contract tower operations at nonprimary and general aviation contract

tower airports. For the CARES Act passed by Congress in late March, <u>all</u> contract tower airports may use CARES Act funding for contract tower operations expenses paid by airports (see list below for eligible expenses). For the final funding in the next coronavirus relief package, primary contract tower airports (airports with more than 10,000 annual enplanements and nonprimary and general aviation airports, as part of the \$8.15 million set aside, may use these funds for the same tower operations expenses listed below.

- Tower building maintenance, utilities, tele-communications for contract towers (shout lines, 2-digit dial lines, etc.), janitorial, equipment maintenance service agreements;
- Tower building upgrades/repairs, radios, tele-communications equipment, emergency backup systems, weather reporting equipment, ASOS/AWOS, headsets, digital voice recorders, window shades, chairs, binoculars, light guns, radar;
- Airport cost-share payments at the 11 contract tower cost-share airports;
- Payments for extra contract tower controller staffing/operating hours that airports currently pay outside
  the contracts FCT contractors have with FAA to staff contract towers, and
- Tower sanitization and cleaning costs associated with COVID-19

Regarding the appropriations process and efforts to secure guaranteed funding bill language of \$172.8 million in the fiscal year 2021 spending bill, Reps. Julia Brownley (D-Calif.), Frederica Wilson (D-FL), John Ratcliffe (R-TX) and Rodney Davis (R-IL) organized a group letter signed by 86 House members (49 Democrats and 37 Republicans) that was sent to House Appropriations Committee leaders. Sens. James Inhofe (R-OK) and Richard Blumenthal (D-CT) led a similar effort in the Senate that included 41 Senators on the letter (12 Republicans and 29 Democrats).

AAAE/USCTA also organized a coalition letter from the various groups in Washington on fiscal year 2021 FCT funding that was sent to the leaders of the House and Senate appropriations committees. Signers of the letter included ACI-NA, AOPA, Regional Airline Association, NASAO, NATA, NBAA, Air Traffic Control Association and the Cargo Airline Association.

The FY '21 DOT/FAA spending bill, passed by the House on July 31, includes the industry-requested guaranteed funding of \$172.8 million for the FAA FCT program (\$2.8 million more than the FY '20 enacted funding level). That is the full amount needed to fund all current 256 FAA contract towers, as well as provides funding flexibility for FAA to add three to four new start contract towers.

Senators James Inhofe (R-OK); Jerry Moran (R-KS), and Patty Murray (D-WA) introduced our FCT staffing/social security annuity legislation (S. 2898) in the Senate on November 19, 2019 and Congresswoman Julia Brownley (D-CA) and Rodney Davis (R-IL) introduced the same legislation in House on December 4, 2019. To date we have 46 Senate co-sponsors and 85 House co-sponsors. This legislation could pave the way for an additional 125-150 retired FAA controllers to work at FAA contract towers. S. 2898 was unanimously approved by the Senate Commerce Committee on December 11, 2019.

Regarding FAA reauthorization, the final bill passed by Congress and signed by the President in October 2018 contained very positive and significant pro-airport reforms that will provide needed and long overdue stability to airports with FAA contract towers, including:

- Except for cost-share towers, eliminates the annual benefit/cost (b/c) analysis unless an airport's annual traffic drops by more than 25 percent annually or more than 55 percent over a three-year period;
- Prohibits FAA from adding non-site specific/indirect costs to b/c's (i.e. airways facilities costs, depreciation, etc.);
- Ensures that airports have an adequate opportunity to respond to b/c analyses;

- Automatically adds 10 percentage points to the b/c analysis to capture non-quantifiable benefits of a control tower;
- Lifts the cap on AIP eligibility for contract tower construction to be consistent with other AIP-eligible projects;
- Exempts airports with both Part 121 air service and more than 25,000 annual passenger enplanements from any cost-share payments under the Contract Tower Cost-Share Program;
- Ends the moratorium on FAA considering applicable non-towered airports and non-federal towered airports for the Contract Tower Program and requires the agency to run b/c ratios on the cost-share contract towers, using the factors set forth in the FAA report, Establishment and Discontinuance Criteria for Airport Traffic Control Towers (FAA-APO-90-7 as of August 1990);
- Makes funds available from the Small Airport AIP Fund for contract tower construction/equipment for current contract towers and qualified non-towered airports; and
- Establishes a remote tower pilot program.

We had a productive meeting in Washington October 3, 2019 at FAA with top officials from the agency's air traffic organization and other lines of business to discuss short- and long-term challenges facing the FCT program (see attached agenda for the topics discussed). Attendees from the AAAE side included several airport directors with contract towers and the FCT contractors. Emails, conference calls, and meetings continue on working group action items.

The focus of USCTA in 2020 will be to keep pressure on FAA to run updated b/c ratios for additional non-federal/non-towered airports that have applied to the program and updated b/c's for the cost-share towers and secure full and dedicated funding for contract towers in the DOT/FAA fiscal year 2021 appropriations bill. Additionally, AAAE staff and the USCTA policy board continue to have discussions with FAA about the contract tower construction/equipment funding eligibility from the Small Airport AIP fund; contract tower minimum equipment list; tower operating agreements; remote towers; AFTIL siting process for new contract towers; building security/OSHA inspections of contract towers; staffing challenges at contract towers; liability insurance, and leases for airport-owned towers. Another area of continuing focus for the policy board and the ATC contractors is on recruitment/retention of qualified controllers at FAA contract towers.

We hosted a "virtual" contract tower Zoom webinar on July 10 with 190 participants. We have a USCTA Policy Board Zoom call scheduled for September 14. The annual USCTA Policy Board Strategic Planning Meeting was held January 24 in Monterey, California.
