A. NEW BUSINESS

 Contract for Winter 2020/2021 Bussing Services with Caldwell Transportation Company (CTC) – Consideration of Approval – Attachment #5 ACTION ITEM

Fly Sun Valley Alliance is anticipating much higher MRG air service contract costs in FY21 in addition to a lower overall budget due to decreased LOT revenues. After discussions with Staff and the completion of a financial analysis, the Airport's CARES Act grant will provide the flexibility for the airport to absorb the FY'21 costs associated with Fixed Cost Bussing services provided by Caldwell Transportation Company (CTC) in the amount of \$180,000. As a reminder, these bussing services benefit all outbound and inbound passengers for all airlines using SUN. While not originally budgeted when the airport's FY'21 budget was approved by the Board in August 2020, the approved budget provides some flexibility to accommodate this expense while staying within the overall approved budget amount. As stated above, financial projections to analyze the impact of this expense on the budget have been completed and coordinated with the Airport Finance Committee.

ACTION REQUESTED: Recommend execution of an agreement between FMAA and CTC for bussing services provided to all airlines operating at SUN for FY'21 only, in the amount of \$180,000.

 Recommendation of Award for Multi-Tasking Equipment (MTE) for Airfield Snow Removal – Consideration of Approval – Attachment #6 ACTION ITEM

The airport recently took possession of a new piece of Snow Removal Equipment (SRE) comprised of a carrier vehicle with a 24' front mount plow and a 22' mid-mount broom with air blast system referred to as Multi-Tasking Equipment (MTE). This equipment was "piggybacked" off a procurement by the Idaho Falls Regional Airport where the low bidder was M-B Companies of New Holstein, WI with a price of \$680,114.

This equipment will be a force multiplier for winter snow removal operations as it serves two functions (both plow and broom) with one operator. Based on several factors, including the new instrument approach becoming available and continual need to replace and enhance our snow removal fleet capabilities and fleet, Staff believes it necessary to proceed with ordering a second MTE from M-B Companies at the original bid price of

\$684,213 (including Change Order). The Airport would take delivery of the vehicle after September 30, 2021, so payment would be due as a FY '22 expense.

Due to lead time, it is critical to place the order now so the equipment is delivered before next winter. This acquisition is to be funded with local funds only relieving the need to complete FAA procurement requirements.

ACTION REQUESTED: Motion to Approve acquisition of a second MTE from M-B Companies at the original bid price of \$684,213.

This item remains on the agenda for additional discussion and updates by the Board if necessary.

As discussed at the August and September FMAA meetings, the Amended and Restated Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) between Blaine County and the City of Hailey dated July, 2011, expires on December 31, 2020. The JPA is the enabling document for the Friedman Memorial Airport Authority as an independent entity and is necessary to maintain the current operation of the Authority and the Airport. The 2011 amendment to the JPA contemplated normal operations of the Airport as well as revised provisions addressing the planning of a replacement airport. This expanded the Board from 5 to 7 and requires at least two votes from each the County and the City on almost all decisions. The 2011 JPA remains the document under which the Authority and airport currently operate.

The present JPA could be amended to simply extend its duration for a period of time, or a more extensive revision may be appropriate based on discussions between the City and County. In any event, a decision to extend and/or otherwise amend the JPA must be made no later than our December, 2020 meeting.

3. Airport Planning Projects

i. Environmental Assessment (Land Acquisition) – Update

Preparation of an Environmental Assessment for the land acquisition project continues. Efforts to date include preparation of the description of proposed project, purpose and need, project alternatives, and identification of affected environment and potential environmental consequences. In coordination with the landowner, Mead & Hunt and their subconsultants conducted fieldwork to identify biological and cultural resources within the project area in September and October. These studies include checking for wetlands, surface waters, habitats, historic and archeological resources that could be impacted by the acquisition of this property. The studies included careful consideration of the proposed location for GA hangars and apron space.

Coordination with the FAA is ongoing to discuss the project and coordination on cultural resources, specifically impacts to the historic district and features on the subject property. A preliminary Draft Environmental Assessment is anticipated in November for FMAA review. FAA review of the document is expected in early 2021. Public release of the draft document for review and comment is expected early next year. Completion of the Environmental Assessment process, including a Finding of No Significant Impact by the FAA, is expected in spring of 2021.

ii. Terminal Area Plan – Update

Preparation of the Terminal Area Plan continues by Mead & Hunt. Existing conditions preliminary technical brief is close to completion, the consultant team completed interviews/discussions with terminal tenants including SkyWest, Horizon, TSA, and the rental car companies the week of November 9. A technical brief on the capacity analysis will be completed November 20. Initial recommendations on focus areas for improvements will be made following the capacity assessment.

Chairman Greenberg reported he has been meeting with the FMA Finance and Land Acquisition Committees; both have been active and moving forward. There will be an update on the land acquisition during the executive session tonight.

B. Blaine County Report

Board Member Fosbury reported Blaine County has been alternating between Orange and Red Category for COVID-19, and at the time of this meeting, Blaine County was categorized as Orange (High Risk Level). Board Member Fosbury asked for all members of the community to follow the CDC guidelines for COVID-19. Board Member McCleary reported there was discussion with the medical directors and city mayors on the potential of considering a 14-day quarantine for visitors. There was Board discussion regarding implementing a 14-day quarantine and the affect it could potentially have on the airport. Board Member McCleary stated there is no recommendation for visitor quarantine at this time.

C. City of Hailey Report

Board Member Haemmerle reiterated Board Member Fosbury asking the public to adhere to CDC guidelines for COVID-19.

D. Fly Sun Valley Alliance Report

No Report was given.

E. Airport Manager Report (see Power Point Presentation)

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported September passenger enplanements are down from last September 57.6%, however operations are up 20% from last year. This brings the total year-to-date operations to -6.5% from 2019.

Airport Manger Pomeroy reported he has been working with Carol Waller, Sun Valley Alliance, on the winter schedule for air carriers. Due to COVID, Airport Manager Pomeroy is not sure if FMA will continue the terminal host program and asked for Board input. There was interest by the Board to continue with the host program, so Airport Manager Pomeroy will move forward to see if FMA can hire this position during the holiday/peak season.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported he is expecting the new approach procedure to come online next month with air carrier service starting December 1st. The FMA operations department has been busy planning and training for the increase in operations.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported the Triennial Drill was very successful and thanked Greg Beaver and the operations staff for a job well done. Airport Manager Pomeroy also thanked local fire fighters and first responders for participating in drill.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported our Annual TSA inspection went extremely well and thanked Steve Guthrie for his outstanding efforts as the FMA Security Coordinator.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported Tim Burke, the new FMA Airport Operations Manager, will be starting in two weeks.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported the multi-tasking equipment (MTE) was delivered last month and the ARFF Fire Truck will be delivered next week.

Airport Manager Pomeroy plans to attend the NWAAAE Annual Membership Meeting in Salt Lake City on October 23. He is currently serving on the NWAAAE Board as Secretary/Treasurer and has been nominated as 2nd Vice President for 2021.

Airport Manager Pomeroy explained T-O Work Order 21-01, Rehabilitate Runway 13-31, Taxiway and Section 1 & 3 Aprons. The work order is for design and bid services with a fee estimate of \$477,358.17. The project is AIP eligible. With the FMAA share of 6.25%, the project total would be \$29,835, which is currently included in the FMA FY '21 budget. The proposed project timeline is as follows:

Design: winter 2021

Bid: spring 2021

• Construction: spring 2022

Airport Manager Pomeroy outlined some additions to the runway: install runway surface condition system, paved shoulders, construct a blast pad, replace runway signs, and relocate perimeter fence.

Board Member Fairfax expressed concern about the proposed timeline. He asked why FMA will be bidding in spring of 2021 with work starting over a year later in summer 2022. Nathan Cuvala with T-O Engineers responded that FMA needs a firm contract in order to receive the FAA grant. When FMA receives the grant from the FAA, which is expected in the summer of 2021, then the contractor can lock in firm costs for the project. Cuvala confirmed the contract will have provisions for the contractor to lock in firm costs, therefore FMA can receive accurate bid for project.

MOTION: Made by Board Member Haemmerle to approve T-O Work Order #21-01 in the amount of \$477,358.17. Seconded by Board Member Fairfax.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is made and entered into as of the date last set forth below by and among Caldwell Transportation Company Inc, (CTC) and the Friedman Memorial Airport Authority ("FMAA"). For purposes of this agreement, Fly Sun Valley Alliance (FSVA) will serve agent for FMAA with respect to the oversight and execution of CTC's obligations under this Agreement.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, CTC has the ability and expertise to provide high quality ground transportation bus service for Friedman Memorial Airport (SUN) commercial airline passengers when their flights are diverted to Twin Falls Airport (TWF) or to Boise (BOI) due to weather, on the terms and conditions set forth herein:

WHEREAS, enhanced busing services support FMAA's airport operations at SUN by promoting air transportation among passengers and incentivizing commercial air carriers;

WHEREAS providing busing services ensures that passengers have convenient access to SUN facilities even when weather or other events beyond the control of the FMAA make it impossible for airlines to operate at SUN; and

WHEREAS FMAA has concluded that the cost of the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement are expenses directly related to the operation of SUN and to the provision of air transportation services to the community; and

WHEREAS FMAA is providing the services contemplated by this Agreement to any airline passenger using SUN regardless of their choice of airline;

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the above recitals and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto, intending to be legally bound hereby, agree as follows:

Enhanced Services

CTC shall provide enhanced, at the ready, ground transportation services ("Enhanced Services") between SUN, TWF and BOI using commercial coaches, and vans or equivalent equipment. Enhanced Services during the term of this Agreement shall consist of the following:

Equipment and Storage

<u>Coaches:</u> 47 or more passenger seating, in excellent condition including interior upholstery, cleanliness, fully operational seats, heating, restrooms, operational Wi-Fi, etc. No visible signs of deferred interior or exterior maintenance. CTC will maintain the coaches in proper condition

throughout the service period, including replacement if warranted. Coaches are subject to inspection by FSVA at CTC locations with 24hour advance notice.

<u>Vans:</u> At least 10 passenger vans with room for luggage behind the last row of seats. In excellent condition including interior upholstery, cleanliness, fully operational seats, heating, etc. No visible signs of deferred interior or exterior maintenance. CTC will maintain the vans in proper condition throughout the service period, including replacement if warranted. Vans are subject to inspection by FSVA at CTC locations with 24-hour advance notice.

Equipment Storage: All coaches used for this service will be stored in enclosed shops that are located no more than 15 minutes from each airport (SUN and BOI). At TWF the vehicles will be parked at the airport. The drivers have to be at the airport for each arriving (SUN) flight so they will start and warm up each piece of equipment before there is any chance of a flight landing in TWF.

Drivers & Hosts

<u>Drivers:</u> All drivers will be hired directly by CTC and will be DOT qualified with appropriate licenses. They will maintain professional appearance, conduct and will have operational and customer service training provided by CTC before the start of their work related to this contract service and ongoing as needed. Drivers will be scheduled to be available on-call throughout the contract season, as determined by CTC to meet performance standards. CTC will continuously monitor driver performance throughout the season of drivers and take immediate corrective action to correct any operational or customer service deficiencies.

Hosts: Hosts will be hired by CTC to assist with operations related to diverted passengers both in TWF and SUN. There will be two hosts in TWF from December 19 through March 29 and one host in TWF and SUN for the full season. They will maintain professional appearance, conduct and will have operational and customer service training provided by CTC, with supplemental training provided by FSVA, airport management staff and airlines, before the start of their work related to this contract service and ongoing as needed. They must have good knowledge of the local area. They will maintain a close working relationship with the counter staff at both airports; anticipate a potential diversion, and make sure drivers and equipment are in place and at the ready. The host must be able to answer questions from the staff as to where the drivers are, what time they left the airport and what their anticipated arrival time is.

Communications between CTC and Partners & Passengers

To the best of their ability, CTC will use the following procedures to improve communications with partners and passengers:

 CTC TWF Host will set up an email message system with all hotel shuttle drivers, rental car reps and SUN SkyWest staff to alert them when bus is leaving TWF. FSVA will provide CTC staff with an email message list at the beginning of the season, and updates as needed.

- CTC TWF Hosts will supply small cards (provided by FSVA) to hand out to arriving passengers that contain important phone numbers for airlines, hotel shuttles, taxis, rental cars.
- CTC will install a GPS tracking system on its buses and will provide a password to any stakeholder (airline staff, airport staff, hotel shuttle staff, car rental staff, etc.) to access the system to track busses in real-time.
- CTC bus drivers will play the FSVA-produced five-minute video on the bus immediately upon leaving airport (TWF or BOI). The video will explain the steps passengers need to take to inquire about their outbound SUN flight in case of diversion.
- CTC buses and vans will have a display case for the Diversion flyers (produced by each airline) and make available to passengers. It is CTC's responsibility to get flyers from airlines, keep the flyers stocked on busses and vans.
- CTC will ensure all employees involved in busing program (drivers and hosts) understand all
 procedures and can communicate them effectively with passengers.

Basic Services: CTC will contract or make arrangements directly with airlines serving SUN (United, Delta and Alaska) to provide basic ground transportation services for passengers on diverted flights during the November 1, 2020 – April 15, 2021 winter season. CTC will bill each airline for services rendered. This contract for Enhanced Services is predicated on CTC having contracts or arrangements for Basic Services in place with each airline during the Enhanced Services contract period.

Performance Standards

Planned Diversions

When the weather forecast at SUN necessitates diversions to TWF and/or BOI and CTC has been given at least one-hour advanced notice of the planned diversion from the airline, CTC shall provide:

<u>At SUN:</u> CTC shall have drivers, equipment and hosts at the airport ready to assist airline staff and passengers at the time the airline requests. The host will gather passengers, answer questions, help them with luggage and direct them to the appropriate bus departing to TWF or BOI as instructed by airline. CTC will have a sufficient number of seats and one host ready and available for each flight.

<u>At TWF:</u> The coach from SUN will be able to pick up the passengers at TWF and deliver them back to SUN. CTC will have at least one host in place to assist passengers, and two hosts during the December 19 - March 29 period.

Unplanned Diversions

For all other diversions to TWF and/or BOI due to weather where CTC is given less than one-hour notice from the airline, CTC shall provide:

<u>At TWF:</u> CTC shall have drivers, equipment and hosts on stand-by at the airport ready to assist airline staff and passengers when the unplanned diverted flight arrives. The host will gather passengers, answer questions, help them with luggage and direct them to the bus departing to SUN on time as instructed by airline. CTC shall have a sufficient number of seats and one host ready and available for each flight.

<u>At SUN:</u> In the event of an unplanned diversion to TWF, the outbound SUN flight is canceled and its passengers rebooked on a later flight.

At BOI: CTC shall have coaches and vans with a sufficient number of seats at the ready for any diverted Alaska flights.

TERMS:

Enhanced Service Contract Term. November 1, 2020 – April 15, 2021

Payment Terms. Upon receipt of invoice, FMAA will pay CTC a total of \$180,000 for the service contract term; \$36,000 per month for five months. Payments will be made by the 10th of each month, however the payment for November will be made November 20, 2020, and last payment made no later than March 10, 2021. CTC will provide FSVA with monthly invoices.

Assumption of Liability/Indemnification. FMAA and all affiliated entities hereby disclaim any and all liability of passengers or other third parties associated with the Enhanced Services described herein. Such liability is solely the responsibility of CTC and this Agreement may not be construed as an assumption of liability on the part of FMAA. Furthermore, CTC agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless FMAA and FSVA, and its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, losses, actions or judgements for damages or injury to persons or property arising out of or in connection with the acts and/or any performance or activities of CTC, CTC's agents, employees, or representatives under this agreement.

Insurance. CTC agrees to obtain and keep in force during its acts under this Agreement, a comprehensive general liability insurance policy in the minimum amount of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000.00), which shall name and protect CTC, all CTC's employees, FMAA, and its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, losses, actions and judgements for damages or injury to persons or property arising out of or in connection with the CTC's acts. CTC shall provide proof of liability coverage as set forth above to FMAA prior to commencing its performance as herein provided and require insurer to notify FMAA ten (10) days prior to cancellation of said policy.

Independent Contractor. The parties agree that CTC and its employees are independent contractors of FMAA and in no way employees or agents of FMAA or FSVA and are not entitled to worker's compensation or any other benefit of employment with FMAA or FSVA. Neither FMAA nor FSVA shall have control over the performance of this agreement by CTC, except to specify the time and place of performance and the results to be achieved. CTC agrees to pay and be responsible for all taxes due from the compensation received under this agreement.

Default. It is mutually understood and agreed that (a) if any material default of the Agreement is made by CTC, this Agreement may be terminated by FMAA upon thirty (30) days written notice to CTC from FMAA.

Early Termination Option. Except as provided above under Default, it is mutually understood that FMAA may terminate this Agreement for any reason with ninety (90) days written notice and a lump sum payment to CTC, as follows: \$34,700 per month for the ninety-day period (three months) or \$104,100, less any previous payments already made.

Non-Disclosure. The parties agree that the information contained in this Agreement is of a proprietary nature and will make all reasonable efforts to ensure that this document's contents are provided only to those individuals with a need to know, subject to FMAA's disclosure obligations under the Idaho Public Records Act.

Assignment. This Agreement and the rights and obligations hereunder shall not be assigned by either party hereto without prior written consent of the other party. Although, CTC may use another carrier, drivers and equipment occasionally provided the drivers and equipment meet the standards of this contract.

Subordination. This Agreement shall be subject and subordinate to the provisions of any existing or future agreements between FMAA and the United States of America, relative to the operation and maintenance of the Friedman Memorial Airport, the terms and execution of which have been or may be required as a condition precedent to the expenditure by or reimbursement to the FMAA of federal funds for the development of the Airport ("Grant Assurances"). In the event that this Agreement, either on its own terms or by any other reason, conflicts with or violates such Grant Assurances, FMAA has the right unilaterally to amend, alter or otherwise modify the terms of this Agreement in order to resolve such conflict or violation. CTC further agrees that it shall not knowingly cause FMAA to violate any Grant Assurances made by FMAA to the federal government in connection with the granting of such federal funds.

Governing Law. This Agreement shall at times be subject to federal, state, and local laws and to all applicable rules and regulations of any governmental agencies or other entity with oversight authority. No party shall be liable to the others if it is prevented from fulfilling its obligation thereunder by any reason of any such law, rule or regulation. This Agreement shall, in all respects,

and unless otherwise provided for herein, be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Idaho.

Attorney Fees. Reasonable attorney fees shall be awarded to the prevailing party in any action to enforce this agreement.

Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof. This Agreement may be modified or amended only in writing and signed by the parties. It is understood that CTC will make every attempt in good faith to hire qualified drivers and hosts but cannot guarantee the quality and quantity of employees. CTC does guarantee that all drivers will meet the full requirements of all state and federal laws.

Time is of the Essence. Time is of the essence in each and every term hereof.

PROCUREMENT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is dated as of the <u>17th day of November</u> the year <u>2020</u> by and between the **Friedman Memorial Airport Authority**, **1616 Airport Circle**, **Hailey**, **ID 83333** (hereinafter called Owner) and <u>M-B Companies</u>, <u>Inc. 1200 Park Street</u>, <u>Chilton</u>, <u>WI 53014</u> (hereinafter called Contractor).

Owner and Contractor, in consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter set forth, agree as follows:

Article 1 GOODS AND SERVICES

Contractor shall furnish all Goods, Special Services and other services as specified or indicated in the Contract Documents. The Goods and Special Services to be furnished are generally described by Schedule, or part thereof as identified in the Notice of Award as follows:

Procurement of Multi-Tasking Equipment (MTE) for Airfield Snow Removal

The Project for which the Goods and Special Services under the Contract Documents may be the whole or only a part is generally described as follows:

Procurement of Multi-Tasking Equipment (MTE) for Airfield Snow Removal Idaho Falls Regional Airport Idaho Falls, Idaho FAA/AIP Project No. 3-16-0018-045

Article 2 ENGINEER

The Goods have been specified by T-O Engineers, 2471 S. Titanium Place, Meridian, Idaho 83642-6703, who is hereinafter called Engineer and who will assume all duties and responsibilities and will have the rights and authority assigned to Engineer in the Contract Documents in connection with completion of the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents.

Article 3 POINT OF DELIVERY

The place where the Goods are to be delivered as defined in the Procurement General Conditions as the point of delivery and designated as the Airport Operations Building, Friedman Memorial Airport, Hailey, Idaho.

Article 4 CONTRACT TIME

- 4.1 The Goods are to be delivered to the point of delivery, commissioned and ready for Owner's acceptance on or before **330 calendar days** from the effective date of the Procurement Agreement. Work encompassed by this Agreement as identified in Article 1 above shall be Complete and ready for Final Payment, in accordance with paragraph 10.06 of the Procurement General Conditions; in accordance with the following:
- 4.2 The furnishing of Special Services to the Owner shall conform to the requirements of Specification Section 011100 Summary of Work, Part 3.
- 4.3 All Shop Drawings and samples required by the Contract Documents shall be submitted to Engineer for review and approval as identified in Specification Section 011100 Summary of Work, Part 2.
- 4.4 Liquidated Damages. Owner and Contractor recognize that time is of the essence of this Agreement and that Owner will suffer financial loss if the Goods are not delivered at the point of delivery and ready for acceptance of delivery by Owner before the time specified in paragraph 4.1 above, plus any extensions thereof allowed in accordance with Article 7 of the Procurement General Conditions. They also recognize that the timely performance of services by other parties involved in proving in a legal or arbitration proceeding the actual loss suffered by Owner if the Goods are not delivered on time. Accordingly, instead of requiring any such proof, Owner and Contractor agree that as liquidated damages for delay (but not as a penalty) Contractor shall pay Owner Five Hundred and 00/100 dollars (\$500.00) for each day that expires after the time specified in paragraph 4.1 for delivery of acceptable Goods.

Article 5 CONTRACT PRICE

Owner shall pay Contractor for furnishing the Goods and Special Services and for performing other services in accordance with the Contract Documents in current funds as follows: See copy of Bid (and attachments) marked Exhibit 2, attached.

Article 6 PAYMENT PROCEDURES

Contractor shall submit Applications for Payment in accordance with Article 10 of the Procurement General Conditions and Specification Section 007301 Supplementary Conditions.  - 6.1.2 The Contractor is notified and accepts by execution of the Procurement Agreement, that progress payments may not be made for up to 60 (sixty) days from the date of receipt of the payment request by the Owner. Owner shall within sixty days after receipt of each Application for Payment with Engineer's recommendation pay Contractor the amount recommended; but in the case of the Application for Payment upon Owner's acceptance of delivery of the Goods, said sixty day period may be extended for so long as is necessary for Owner to examine the bill of sale and other documentation submitted therewith. Owner shall notify Contractor promptly of any deficiency in the documentation and shall not unreasonably withhold payment.
- 6.2 Final Payment. Upon receipt of the final Application for Payment accompanied by Engineer's recommendation of payment in accordance with paragraph 10.6 of the Procurement General Conditions, Owner shall pay the remainder of the Contract Price as recommended by Engineer as provided in said paragraph 10.06. If the Application and accompanying documentation are appropriate as to form and substance, Owner shall, within sixty days after receipt thereof, pay Contractor the amount recommended by the Engineer.
- 6.3 Payments to Subcontractors. The Contractor agrees to pay each subcontractor under this prime contract for satisfactory performance of its contract no later than 30 days from the receipt of each payment the Contractor receives from the Owner. The Contractor agrees further to return retainage payments to each subcontractor within 30 days after the subcontractors work is satisfactorily completed. Any delay or postponement of payment from the above referenced timeframe may occur only for good cause following written approval of the Owner. This clause applies to both Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) and non-DBE subcontractors. Failure by the Contractor to carry out these requirements shall be a material breach of the agreement.

Article 7 INTEREST

All amounts not paid when due shall bear interest at the rate of 5 percent per annum.

Article 8 CONTRACTOR'S REPRESENTATIONS

In order to induce Owner to enter into this Agreement, Contractor makes the following representations:

- 8.1 Contractor has familiarized himself with the nature and extent of the Contract Documents and has given Engineer written notice of all conflicts, errors or discrepancies that he has discovered in the Contract Documents and the written resolution thereof by the Engineer is acceptable to the Contractor.
- 8.2 Contractor has familiarized himself with all local conditions and Federal, State and local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations that in any manner may affect cost, production and delivery of the Goods and furnishing Special Services and other services in connection therewith.
- 8.3 Contractor does not require additional information from Owner or Engineer to enable Contractor to furnish Goods, Special Services and other services at the Contract Price, within the Contract Time and in accordance with the other terms and conditions of the Contract Documents, but subject to Contractor's right to request interpretations and clarifications in accordance with paragraph 9.02 of the Procurement General Conditions.

Article 11 OTHER PROVISIONS
