i. New Instrument Approach - Update

As the Board is aware, the airport's new instrument approach went online for Skywest Airlines on December 3, 2020. The approach has proven very effective in improving reliability and flight completion rates for Skywest flights thus far this winter. With Skywest now using the approach as the "launch customer", focus will now shift to use of the approach by capable operators in the general aviation fleet.

Alec Seybold from Flight Tech Engineering will be in attendance at the meeting to provide a brief update to the Board regarding status of the approach and the expected steps.

ii. Airport Minimum Standards and Rules and Regulations - DiscussionAttachment #6 & 7

As discussed at the January meeting, staff is initiating a project to update the airport's Minimum Standards and Rules and Regulations. Both are considered critical guiding documents by the FAA for airport management and both need an update. The current Airport Minimum Standards were last updated in 1997 and Rules and Regulations in 1974. The project will be completed with the assistance of our planning consultant team, Mead & Hunt and subconsultants. The update of these documents was identified in the planning selection and the project was accounted for in the approved FY2021 budget.

Staff continues to move forward with initial, basic coordination with our consultant team to get the project started. As requested by Staff at the last meeting, Board participation in and oversight of the project in the form of committee is recommended. As requested by the Board Chairman, short summaries of the background and potential elements of the documents are included as ATTACHMENTS 6 and 7 to assist the Board with discussion and selection of a committee at the meeting.

 - i. Environmental Assessment (Land Acquisition) Update

Preparation of an Environmental Assessment (EA) for the proposed land acquisition project continues. FAA is in coordination with the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). Discussions with the SHPO are regarding the determination of effect to historic resources for the project and potential measures to avoid or minimize adverse impacts. The preliminary draft Purpose and Need and Alternatives descriptive sections were provided for airport staff review and comment and then revised based on staff feedback.

We are awaiting SHPO concurrence with the FAA before completion of the preliminary draft. A preliminary draft anticipated in early 2021. Public release of the draft document for review and comment is expected shortly after the preliminary draft comments are addressed and FMAA and FAA approve the document for release. Completion of the Environmental Assessment process, including a Finding of No Significant Impact by the FAA, is expected in spring of 2021.

ii. Terminal Area Plan – Update

Preparation of the Terminal Area Plan continues by Mead & Hunt. Airport staff provided comments on the terminal area inventory report in January and Mead & Hunt is revising the report to address these comments. The revised report will be delivered to Airport staff in early February along with the capacity analysis findings, which are currently being finalized. Work on alternative layout plans for the terminal building and overall terminal area will begin in February.

Mead & Hunt staff will provide a presentation with an overview work-to-date at the March Authority Board meeting.

B. Blaine County Report

Blaine County Commissioner Greenberg reported the COVID numbers have been good in Blaine County, however he would like to remind everyone to continue with COVID protocols with increased risks due to holiday and visitor travel.

C. City of Hailey Report

Mayor Burke and Board-Vice Chairman welcomed Sam Linnet to the FMA Board.

D. Fly Sun Valley Alliance Report

Carol Waller reported she has been very excited to see the changes the new approach is having with flight completions. She thanked everyone involved in making this a reality. The Alliance continues to monitor bookings and is starting to work on the summer 2021 flight schedule.

E. Airport Manager Report (see Power Point Presentation)

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported passenger enplanements for December were down 52% from previous year. Operations increased from December of last year by 4.6%. The total operations for the year are down 2.1% from last year. Airport

Manager Pomeroy reported he is pleased with the number of total operations for 2020, given the steep decline in air carrier service last spring. The increase in general aviation activity during the summer was a substantial reason FMA operations stayed relatively stable for 2020.

Airport Manger Pomeroy reported the terminal was very busy with eleven air carrier flights daily over the holiday peak. He extended his thanks to the FMA operations team, TSA, Airlines and The Car Park for their extra work these last few weeks. The team did an excellent job with COVID protocols and social distancing.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported there were a few days of heavy air traffic during the holiday, causing air space capacity issues and in-air and departure delays. This is something he has been working on the last few years with Salt Lake City Center and the FAA. He continues to work with FMA consultant Greg Dyer, and they have some new ideas on helping to resolve these issues in the future.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported the new approach went online December 3rd and is going very well so far with great completion of flights. He reported 24 "saves" on flights that likely would have been diverted last year. It will take approximately a year to determine numbers and stats of the new approach, but so far it is proving to be very successful.

Airport Operations Manager Tim Burke reported the operations team has responded extremely well to the stress the new approach has had on runway operations during winter snow events. Burke reported the success is directly related to the combined experience of our operations team and new equipment. Burke stressed the importance of new equipment to keep up with FAA runway requirements and the increased landings during the winter due to the approval and use of the new approach that went live in early December 2020.

Board Chairman Greenberg mentioned the investment in operations equipment has been significant the last few years and with the new approach being approved last month it has paid off. He remined the Board of the need to keep investing in equipment to keep up with increasing requirements of winter operations required by the FAA. Members of the Board agreed with Greenberg and commented on the outstanding work of the FMA operations team.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported he attended a Blaine County Planning and Zoning meeting in December to discuss the draft Airport Vicinity Overlay District and airspace protection and land use compatibility. The county commissioners were overall very pleased with his presentation with a few minor revisions requested. He is working with the Land Use Department to make the requested changes and will present another draft at the next meeting in January.

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported he continues to work with City of Hailey and Blaine County on the Joint Powers Agreement that has been extended to April 15, 2021

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported he has received draft documents from Mead & Hunt. He reviewed them and has provided his feedback to Mead & Hunt and they continue to move forward with the assessment. The team is currently working with the FAA on coordination with State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO).

Brad Rolf with Mead & Hunt reported that he has been in contact with the FAA and the State Historic Preservation Office and they continue to work towards resolution of concerns between the two agencies.

ii. Terminal Area Plan - Update

Airport Manager Pomeroy reported the terminal area plan is going well. He introduced Evan Barrett and Mark Sorenson with Mead & Hunt.

Evan Barrett with Mead & Hunt provided the Board with a project status update. The plan normally starts with a forecasting study, however with COVID this has been postponed and they have started with a capacity study. Mr. Barrett mentioned the following has been completed: functional component inventory, stakeholder kick-off interviews, terminal building capacity assessment and comparison with existing passenger demand. The

next steps are the terminal area capacity assessment, FAA coordination, forecast scenarios, development alternatives, and continued stakeholder coordination.

Mark Sorenson with Mead & Hunt provided the Board with a detailed review on the capacity study. The terminal, aircraft apron, public parking, vehicle access and parking circulation and rental car facilities were specified areas studied. Flight arrivals and departures were analyzed in addition to airport operations. Mr. Sorenson reported the terminal is over capacity for departing passengers a good amount of the time during the peak season, and over capacity on arrivals when two arrivals occur at the same time.

Board Member Burke asked how the FAA determines the financial contribution when looking at a terminal area plan. Airport Manager Pomeroy responded the FAA typically supports funding associated with passenger movement in a terminal. They are less likely to fund, or will fund less, for areas that would be utilized by airline ticket counters.

There was Board discussion regarding the timing of study during COVID. Mr. Sorenson responded that the terminal is now over capacity and COVID, if anything, decreased travel. Mr. Barrett followed up stating that any plan funded by the FAA would include a 10-year forecast; this is the reason for delaying the forecast component of study.

MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR PROVIDING AERONAUTICAL SERVICES TO THE PUBLIC

BACKGROUND

The development of updated *Minimum Standards for Providing Aeronautical Services to the Public* ("Minimum Standards") by the Friedman Memorial Airport Authority (Authority) will encourage, promote, and ensure, to the greatest extent possible, the following at the Friedman Memorial Airport (Airport):

- the delivery of high-quality aeronautical products, services, and facilities to airport customers;
- the design and development of quality aeronautical facilities and improvements;
- safety and security;
- the economic health of the Airport and aeronautical businesses;
- the orderly development of Airport property;
- the protection of the environment; and
- the establishment of a consistent policy to ensure similar treatment of similarly situated entities.

Minimum Standards are developed taking into consideration the role of an airport; the range, level, and quality of aeronautical products, services, and facilities currently being provided at an airport; the future needs for and the anticipated development of the airport and the community it serves, and the promotion of fair competition.

Updated Minimum Standards will provide threshold entry requirements for those entities wishing to offer Aeronautical Services to the public at the Airport; ensure that those entities obtaining the approval of the Authority to engage in such activities are not exposed to unfair competition; and protect the public from unsafe or inadequate or substandard aeronautical products, services, and facilities. Adoption of updated Minimum Standards by the Authority would also assist with compliance with FAA Grant Assurance 22 *Economic Nondiscrimination* Sections (h) and (i) (see 49 U.S.C. § 47107), which provides that an airport owner / operator may establish reasonable, and not unjustly discriminatory, conditions to be met by all users of an airport as may be necessary for its safe and efficient operation.

OUTLINE

It is proposed that the Authority's Minimum Standards will include the following sections:

- Statement of Policy this section will describe the intent, scope, and purpose of the Authority's Minimum Standards.
- Definitions a list of defined terms will be offered to provide the reader with references and an understanding
 of the terms and phrases used in the Authority's Minimum Standards document.
- General Requirements this section will offer baseline information and operating requirements for all entities seeking to provide aeronautical services to the public at the Airport.
- Application Process each entity seeking to offer aeronautical services to the public at the Airport will be required to submit a formal application for consideration by the Authority. This section will describe the

contents of the application document, the process the Authority will use to consider the merits of an application; and a description of reasons that the Authority can deny such requests.

- Requirements and Minimum Standards for full-service Fixed Base Operators (FBOs) a description of the services (i.e.: Fueling (Jet A and Avgas); Aircraft Airframe and Engine Maintenance and Repair; Air Taxi/Charter Services; and line (ground) services and customer services) to be offered by a full-service FBO is to be provided. In addition, minimum standards for premises, personnel, licenses and certifications, operating hours, equipment, and insurance to engage in such activities will also be described.
- Requirements and Minimum Standards for Specialized Aviation Service Operators (SASOs) this section will describe minimum standards for premises, personnel, licenses and certifications, operating hours, equipment, and insurance for an entity to engage in one or more specialized aviation service including:
 - Aircraft Airframe and Engine Inspection, Maintenance, and Repair
 - Air Taxi/ Charter
 - Flight Training
 - Independent Flight Instructor
 - Aircraft Rental
 - Aircraft Management
 - Specialized Commercial Flying Services including commercial glider operations, fixed wing and helicopter sightseeing flights / tours, skydiving operations, banner towing operations, aerial application, aerial photography or survey, powerline, or pipeline patrol; and any other operations specifically excluded from 14 Code of Federal Regulations Part 135
 - Commercial Hangar Operator
 - Aircraft Sales
 - Specialized Aircraft Repair Services (Radios, Propellers, Instruments, Accessories, etc.)
- Waiver of Minimum Standards Provisions a description of when and how the Authority may waive the provisions of its Minimum Standards will be described.
- FAA Required Lease Provisions a description of the FAA required lease provisions related to exclusive rights, subordination, emergency leasing to the United States, non-discrimination, and federal grant assurances will be provided in this section.
- Applicability a section describing the effect of enacted Minimum Standards on existing FBOs and SASOs will be offered in this section.

RULES AND REGULATIONS UPDATE

This project is designed to produce updated Rules and Regulations (Rules and Regulations) to govern the general conduct of tenants, employees, and commercial users of the Friedman Memorial Airport (Airport). The Friedman Memorial Airport Authority's (Authority) existing Rules and Regulations were adopted in 1974. Since that time, the Authority has adopted standalone regulations such as Regulation 94-1, governing and regulating ground transportation and baggage transport services at the Airport.

The updated Airport Rules and Regulations will align with current federal, state, local, and Authority adopted rules, regulations, laws, ordinances, and statutes and will include the following sections:

- General Rules and Regulations
- Aircraft Operations
- Motor Vehicle Operations
- Ground Transportation
- Fire and Environmental Safety
- Lease and Tenant Operations & Requirements

- Other Sections as defined by the Airport Authority
